

- 1879 On March 14, Albert Einstein is born, the son of a Jewish electrical engineer in Ulm, Germany. Einstein's theories of special and general relativity drastically altered human understanding of the universe, and his work in particle and energy theory helped make possible quantum mechanics and, ultimately, the atomic bomb.
- **1920** On March 26, 1920, F. Scott Fitzgerald's This Side of Paradise was published, catapulting the 23-year-old to fame. Born in St. Paul, Minnesota, Fitzgerald came from a declining wealthy family. After attending Princeton, he left to join the army during World War I, where he met Zelda Sayre in Alabama. Following rejection due to his financial instability, he rewrote a novel and gained success, convincing Zelda to marry him.

Fitzgerald lived extravagantly, amassing debt and moving to Europe, where he completed The Great Gatsby (1925). Despite publishing numerous short stories, Fitzgerald struggled with alcoholism, and Zelda faced institutionalization after mental breakdowns. His later novel, Tender Is the Night, failed commercially, and he turned to screenwriting in Hollywood. Fitzgerald died of a heart attack in 1940 at age 44, leaving behind a literary legacy marked by both triumph and tragedy.

**1966** On March 5, Marvin Miller, the 48-yearold assistant to the president of the United Steelworkers of America, was elected the first full-time executive director of the Major League Baseball Players Association. Miller, whose role with the United Steelworkers of America included serving as lead negotiator, takes over at a time when the average yearly MLB player's salary is only \$19,000 and the minimum salary is under \$10,000. By the time Miller, a fierce advocate for MLB players, retired in 1982, the average salary for a player was \$241,497.
